**St. Aidan's Annual Meeting
January 31, 2010**

Each congregation of The Episcopal Church is required by Canon law to hold an annual meeting each year upon a day and hour to be determined by the Vestry. The purpose of the meeting is to hear and act upon reports of the rector, the treasurer, the church school, vestry commissions, guilds and organizations; for the election of members of the vestry and for transaction of such other business as may legally and canonically come before the meeting.

St. Aidan's Annual Meeting will be **January 31, 2010**. There will be one offering (only) of the Holy Eucharist at 9:00 a.m. (primarily a Rite II service, but we will, as is our custom, incorporate some elements of Rite I). At this Eucharist, the Rector delivers his annual report to the parish.

Afterwards, we adjourn to Murdock Hall. A brunch will be served in conjunction with the meeting. Please make every effort to attend the Annual Meeting.

Annual Reports are due in to the office by Wednesday, January 20, 2010. If you exercise any ministry in the parish, please turn in a report. Reports for committees and organizations should be sent to the church office via email at **staidans@pacifier.com**. **We are requesting that all reports be turned in electronically via email.** If you do not have word processing, *please type your report in an email* so we can avoid re-typing.

There will be childcare available for the Annual Meeting. We really would like to have all parishioners take part in the Annual Meeting and exercise their privilege to vote on the business matters of the Parish and read the annual reports of the Parish organizations. To vote at the Annual Meeting: one must be:

- Baptized; regular communicant.
- Sixteen (16) years of age or over.
- Parish Member a minimum of 6 months.
- Regular contributor to Parish.
- Present at annual meeting. **No proxy voting.**

A Vestry Nominating Committee has been formulated, consisting of vestry members who will be concluding their ministry: Angie Groce, Betsy Berninghausen, and Marlene Lucas. If you would be interested in serving on the vestry or if you are aware of someone you would like to see on the vestry, please contact one of these three people.

We don't have to say "O" [Oh / Zero] anymore. That is, this New Year we get to say "twenty-ten". Does that sound a little backwards? I hope and pray that the next decade will bring more pleasant surprises than the last. There have been quite a few good things within a generally gloomy decade. I live by the motto "bloom where you are planted" so if I can keep my

own little corner of the planet on a semi-even keel, I praise God and get on with the things I can take care of at my own level and let the rest of the world go by.

In our parish we give thanks for the positive things that have happened, and look forward expectantly to more good stuff in the New Year. Looking back, we want to give thanks for the things that have happened in our recent past. We hear from **Ron Salter** that our giving tree was quite productive this year. He took 77 pounds of Christmas gifts to **SnoCap** the week before Christmas, and observed that the quality of the gifts was impressive this year. Along with that he took 29 pounds of food. The bulletin has a list of other things that **SnoCap** would like including things like: measuring cups, tablespoons, re-usable grocery bags, cake mixes, canned fruit and blankets. The thing about giving these things is that the need doesn't go away; they can always use more. I'm also grateful to the team from St. Aidan's that serves **at Zarephath Kitchen** every third Friday. **Doris** and **Hal Fisher** lead the group of mostly eight-o'clockers, and also several people from outside the parish. Other regulars are: **Marilyn DeWitz**, chief salad-maker, **Elaine Carolin**, cook's helper, **Marion Treviso**, **Bill** and **Shirley Pratt**, servers, **Marion Treviso**, server, **Noriko Sutton**, the kitchen whiz, **Marilyn Pierik**, dishwasher, **Mal** and **Peggy Brewer**, servers and dishwasher's assistant. We also see **Dick Dowsett**, server, lemonade-maker and dishwasher assistant, and **Joan Davidson**, chief cook on a regular basis. Working together all these years has made us a united group, who enjoy working together. You will notice, however, that four of the people on that list are also on the serious prayer list, and as we compare ages, almost all of the team is past 75. We are always happy to add other people to our worker list to help out as needed. Let Doris — or one of the others know if you can volunteer to do it.

Another good thing that happens at Christmas is the **Children's Store**, where our parish kids are assisted in picking out gifts for their families at a price they can afford. **Sharon Barney** and daughter, **Jackie Goodnight** led the charge on this effort on December 6 after church. They served about 10 kids and made \$45.50 for the Sunday School. **Sharon** and **Colleen Hatala** helped kids select their gifts, while the wrappers were **Jackie**, **Sabrina Hanson** and **Kevin Gibler**. **Shirley Vidito** helped kids with tickets from the Parish Hall. "Thanks to all the contributors of both items and money" Sharon says, "and be sure to save a few of your Christmas bags for next year."

The Lessons and Carols service on December 13 was an excellent program, with beautiful music and excellent

readings. Choir Master, **Mark Jones** did an outstanding job leading our choir, string quartet and other musicians in music of the season, and it is a real treat to have **Rebecca Wirkkala** play her flute.

This year's **Wiggler's Mass** on December 20 also went very well. About 45 people enjoyed the outstanding film made by our Sunday School kids (with the expert help of **John Gurney** and **Patrick Hoye**). All the kids who had parts showed up. Following the service **Fr. Scott** read "*The Night Before Christmas*" with the children.

As I write, we are looking forward to the Midnight Mass, It will be fun to sing some Christmas carols on Christmas Eve while we celebrate the Birth of our Lord.

On Selecting Hymns — Part 2

Mark Jones - St. Aidan's Choirmaster and Organist

There are several factors involved in selecting hymns for services at St Aidan's.

First is the appropriateness of the hymn - specifically: does it work with the texts of the readings and, most importantly the gospel lesson.

Secondly, what is the character of the hymn? Is it joyful, plaintive, meditative, etc?

Third, is it in a major or minor key?

Fourth, what is the tempo (fast, moderate, slow) and meter (number of beats to the measure - 2/4, 3/4, 4/4, 6/8, etc.)?

Fifth, how familiar is it to the congregation?

Sixth, how often do we sing this hymn?

The first factor is the most important. I always choose the Sequence Hymn first. That is the hymn that precedes the Gospel procession and reading. This hymn should have a direct reference to the Gospel text. Sometimes there are several to choose from and, frustratingly, sometimes there may be none. There are numerous sources that help me decide what hymns are best. One source is in the back of the organists' Hymnal 1982 Service Music book. I have other books available that also make suggestions. I also receive an email from Synthesis for each month with hymn suggestions and include the Sunday's Proper readings.

On the second factor: of the hymns available to go with the Gospel (assuming that there is at least one) I look at the character. How does the character fit with the message of the Gospel reading? Should the hymn compliment the character of the text or be the antithesis. Do we want to precede the reading extolling joy or seeking meditative mood? Does the major or minor tonalities and tempo compliment the mood being sought? Does the meter imply a walking pace? How about a dance? Is the hymn an "old chestnut" or something relatively unknown - or totally unknown? Has this hymn been sung within the past several weeks?

After I choose the Sequence hymn I usually select the Post-Communion hymn. This is usually fairly easy as there is an entire section of the hymnal dedicated to the Eucharist. On the other hand, there may be another hymn that fits the Gospel or other lesson that might work at the Eucharist, too.

Coming in and going out — the Processional and Recessional hymns. I look for music that has a march/walking characteristic. If possible, I select something that fits either the Gospel or other one of the lessons of the day. We are by no means limited to hymns related to the readings. There are plenty of hymns of praise, thanksgiving, hope, and Christian life that can be used as the Processional and Recessional hymns.

Things to avoid: A service where all of the music is in a minor key - not that that's bad, but can be a little bit of a downer. Lent is an OK time for this, but not too much. A service where all of the hymns are in 3/4 time. This is referred to as a "Skater's Waltz" service. A service where all of the hymns are slow. Contemplative or not, it comes across as a drag and not very uplifting or positive. Presenting more than one unfamiliar hymn in one service. I think learning new hymns is a good thing. There are many unfamiliar hymns in the book that are gems.

Other issues: *First* is my own sense of esthetic. There are several hymns in the book that I do not like for either their musical content, setting of the text within the music, or the weakness of the text itself. One that comes specifically to mind is #661 - They cast their nets. First, the melody is hard to sing with a range greater than an octave and musically it goes nowhere. Second, the poetry of the text is trite with pushed rhyming. Third, the placement of weak words at strong musical moments is too prevalent, e.g.: the word "the" on a strong musical beat. **HOWEVER** - this is an important hymn in that it has a very important message. Therefore I do use it once in a while when appropriate.

Second is my view on some music that is used for hymns. One specific hymn is #522 - Glorious things of thee are spoken. Great text. Great music as it is by Haydn. **HOWEVER**, this music was used by the Nazis as the German national anthem — Deutschland über Alles. For many years I refused to play it because I spent time in Germany during my undergraduate studies and learned more than I wanted to about the atrocities of the Nazis. I also had friends or parents of friends who were directly affected by the Nazi regime. The song is an affront to them. I respect that. **HOWEVER**, many of those who were affected by the Nazis are now departed and the feeling toward this music is becoming less and less offensive. **HOWEVER**

Third is an issue of using music from outside the 1982 Hymnal as hymns and anthems. We generally cannot freely photocopy music from another source and use it as our own. That is copyright infringement and is a serious problem that can result in significant fines. We have licensing agreements with some publishers that allow us to copy music for this specific purpose. Also, some music is so far out of print that it has become public domain. (This is another one of those very long stories that I am not getting into). The upshot here, though, is that if we want to sing music that we do not own, we have to pay for it. Some parishioners have requested a specific hymn that falls into this category. I have no problem with the hymn itself — it's one of those good old rousing chestnuts from the 19th century. The music is good. The text is a little too militant and dated for my taste, but that's OK. I have the music in a couple of other hymnals so the source is no problem. The issue is the copyright, and cost for licensing and reproduction. The publisher would need to be contacted and a formal request made to copy the hymn for a single use. The publisher may require a fee for us to do that. If they approve our usage, then we need to make photocopies enough for all of the choir and parishioners. (There is no money in the budget for purchasing or reproducing music). Finally, ALL of the copies will need to be collected and destroyed.

Finally, some hymns are loved by some people, and some people hate some hymns. There is nothing cut and dried about this. I do what I can based on what I know. I also rely on the experience of Rob Stoltz and Fr. Scott - thank you so much. So if you have requests for hymns, please ask. I will try to use your suggestion.
